## Plant Health Undergraduate Studentships

Nine summer studentship projects on plant health are available for bioscience undergraduates. The selected students will work with leading plant health researchers, gaining great experience as well as receiving a bursary. The projects will run for 10 weeks over summer 2018. The studentships are arranged by the UK Plant Sciences Federation (UKPSF) with funding from Defra, BSPP and N8 AgriFood. Deadline for applications: 9 May 2018

## Innovation to commercialisation of university research (ICURe)

ICURe is a programme of commercialisation support for teams of academic researchers wishing to explore the commercial potential of their research. It aims to improve commercial awareness amongst academic personnel, to develop and enhance the entrepreneurial skills of early career researchers, and to strengthen links between academic and industrial communities. The programme accepts applications from teams based at all UK universities and from all disciplines.

## Call for Nominations: 2018 (34th) International Prize for Biology

The International Prize for Biology is hosted by the Japan Society for the Promotion of Science. Based on nominations gathered from around the world, the Prize is awarded annually to a researcher who has made an outstanding contribution to advance the biological sciences. The research field of this year's Prize is "Palaeontology." Deadline for nominations: 20 April 2018.

## Launch of UKRI Future Leaders Fellowships scheme

The UKRI Future Leaders Fellowship scheme (FLF) aims to develop, retain, attract and sustain research and innovation talent in the UK. Providing up to seven years of funding, for at least 550 early-career researchers and innovators, the scheme will tackle difficult and novel challenges. Deadline 3 July 2018.

## The Nancy Rothwell Award 2018

The Nancy Rothwell Award 2018 specimen drawing competition for 7 - 18 year olds is now open for submissions. Prizes include an experience day at the Royal Veterinary College for students, and their school can also win £100. Closes 10 September 2018.
