### News and debate

## Top stories

#### Ten-year roadmap to guide UK plant science

UK Research and Innovation has announced the new UK Plant Science Research Strategy. The green roadmap for the next 10 years sets out clear goals for research and innovation involving plants.

#### RSB urges PM to reconsider research funding cuts: reduction could "leave a lasting scar on UK science"

Dr Mark Downs CSci FRSB, chief executive of the RSB, has written to the Prime Minister voicing sector concerns following the announcement of £120 million cut to the Global Challenge Research Fund.

#### Interim Office for Environmental Protection to be launched

The new environmental watchdog for England will be launched on an interim basis in July, ahead of its formal establishment as part of the Environment Bill, under plans set out by the Government.

## Plant health and biosecurity

#### UK scientists confirm arrival of brown marmorated stink bugs

Invasive bug that creates marks on fruit and vegetables probably hitched ride into Britain on packaging crates, The Guardian reports.

#### Weeds now represent a greater inherent threat to crop production than before the advent of herbicides, study finds

Crops are now more vulnerable to weeds than before the advent of herbicides, according to a new study which says weeds pose an unprecedented threat to our food security.

#### Slugs and snails crawl back to top of RHS annual garden pests chart

Slugs and snails are back at the top of the pests chart, the Royal Horticultural Society reveals in The Guardian.

## **Plant breeding**

#### **RSB** responds to Defra genome editing consultation

In its response to Defra's consultation on the regulation of genetic technologies, the RSB highlighted the potential benefits to society that changes to regulation could enable. The response proposed that organisms should be assessed on their characteristics, rather than the methods used in breeding. Recognising the importance of public support for any changes to regulation, the RSB emphasised the need for clarity and transparency about how products are created and approved, and called for a broad public dialogue."

#### Government looks poised to lift the ban on gene editing in agriculture

The technique is currently banned in the UK and Europe on safety concerns – with just a handful of scientific trials allowed so far, reports iScience.

#### Genome-edited wheat can reduce cancer risk from toast

UK scientists have used genome editing to reduce a cancer-causing compound, acrylamide, commonly found in toast.

## **Agriculture**

#### 'Bee-killing' pesticide now will not be used on UK sugar beet fields

Government gave emergency authorisation to a neonicotinoid earlier this year - but says weather conditions meant chemical was not needed, The Guardian reports.

#### **Voting Report on AHDB Potato ballot is with Ministers**

A ballot to decide the future of the AHDB Potato levy has concluded and the voting report has been passed to Ministers for a decision on what happens next.

#### Century-old olive trees felled as Spain's farmers try to cut costs

Plunge in global olive oil prices means hard decisions for Spanish olive oil producers.

# **Food security**

#### Over 30 million people 'one step away from starvation', UN warns

Acute hunger is likely to soar in more than 20 countries in the next few months, with the pandemic, climate crisis and conflict driving 'alarming' levels of global hunger, the UN warns.

#### Food waste: Amount thrown away totals 900 million tonnes

More than 900 million tonnes of food is thrown away every year, according to a global report from the UN Environment Programme.

#### Farmers and rights groups boycott food summit over big business links

Some groups say they will boycott UN conference on hunger because of perceived focus on agro-business over ecological and traditional approaches.

#### The UN food systems summit will consider all stakeholders' interests

UN secretary general's special envoy for the 2021 food systems summit responds to reports of a boycott in a letter to The Guardian.

## **Biodiversity and conservation**

#### 'Catastrophic': UK has lost 90% of seagrass meadows, study finds

Scientists say restoring the lush habitats would boost wildlife, protect coasts and store carbon.

#### Lawn growers throw in the trowel as meadows replace perfect stripes

The Guardian reports on a move away from traditional mowing regimes, as aesthetics and wildlife value come under scrutiny.

#### Prehistoric plant found at Saltholme nature reserve

Bearded stonewort, which dates back 460 million years and is critically endangered, was discovered in newly created ponds at RSPB Saltholme, BBC News reports.

#### First known gene transfer from plant to insect identified

Discovery that a whitefly uses a stolen plant gene to elude its host's defences may offer a route to new pest-control strategies, Nature News reports.

#### Vertical mulcher rides to rescue of ancient Northumberland peat bog

The Guardian describes a project to clears trees and restore Border Mires dating from ice age.

## **Forestry**

#### Climate change: Consumer pose 'growing threat' to tropical forests

Rising imports in wealthy countries of coffee, cocoa and other products are a "growing threat" to forests in tropical regions according to a new study.

#### £150 million government investment to protect the world's rainforests

Government announces funding to protect tropical rainforests, regions and communities across Africa, Asia and Latin America.

#### Poland to resume logging in primeval forest

BBC News reports that logging will resume in the primeval Bialowieza forest, after a ruling that Poland had broken EU law by felling trees over 100 years old.

### Indigenous peoples by far the best guardians of forests - UN report

Preserving Latin America's forests is vital to fight the climate crisis and deforestation is lower in indigenous territories, according to a UN report, described in The Guardian.

#### One of Earth's giant carbon sinks may have been overestimated - study

The potential of soils to slow climate change by soaking up carbon may be less than previously thought, research suggests.

#### Grasslands stopped fighting climate change over a century ago

Defra are seeking views on whether the non-native weevil Listronotus elongatus should be released into England to reduce the impact of the invasive weed Hydrocotyle ranunculoides.
